Boys' State History

"To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation" is the purpose of the American Legion Boys' State program, which was organized by the Department of Illinois in 1935.

The Department of Kansas, holding charter number five, was among the first to institute this week-long government-in-action program. Now, virtually every state American Legion, realizing the program's potential for educating youth in practical politics and government operation, has set up its own Boys' State. Boys' State operates under the American Legion Department of Kansas and the Boys' State Committee.

Kansas Boys' State was headquartered in Wichita for 26 years before moving to Lawrence. In 1963, the program moved to the campus of the University of Kansas. That's where it stayed until this past session when it was held for the first time in Manhattan at Kansas State University. It was a successful transition and it appears as though Boys' State and Kansas State will enjoy a pleasant relationship for years to come.

The Boys' State program is available to any high school senior-to-be who meets the academic standards and demonstrates leadership qualities. Civic and church groups as well as American Legion Posts sponsor delegates to this fine "learning-by-doing— youth government program.

More than 42,000 young men from Kansas, including nearly 700 this year alone, have participated in Boys' State performing every function of city, county and state government. Approximately 80 former delegates return each year to serve as counselors. In addition, more than 30 Legionnaires return to assist the counselors in running the program.

During each session, two staters are chosen by their peers to represent Kansas as "senators" of Boys' Nation. The American Legion Boys' Nation program convenes in Washington, D.C. in mid-July where they participate in a national government program.

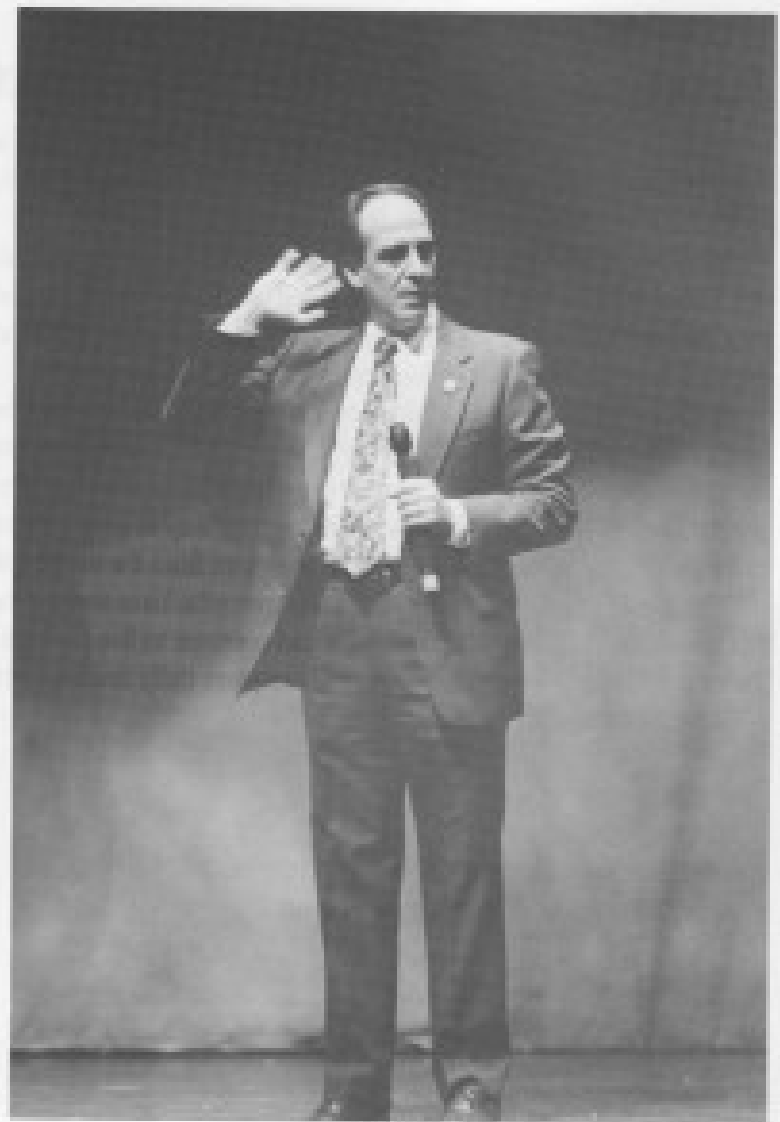
Sunday

The 55th session of Boys' State began Sunday, June 7 in a new location, the campus of Kansas State University in Manhattan. Under bright sunshine, delegates and their parents moved through registration, receiving information containing their political party, city, county and room assignments. Though the lines stretched long out in the parking lot, session began on schedule and with a great deal of optimism and expectation for a productive week.

After getting settled, delegates got acquainted with their city and county counselors and began establishing city governments.

That evening, states heard a motivating speech from Joe Noho concerning democracy and its special meaning to him. After the speech and introduction Boys' State officials, states marched by from McCain Auditorium and elected temporary city officials.

The first full day of Boys' State got under way with the two political parties holding conventions to formulate campaign issues and stances. In a unique turn of events, states were requesting additional time to meet in conventions to discuss issues. States also filed for city, county and state offices, placed campaign material. During the evening assembly, mayors were sworn into office by 1991 Gov. Michael "Bull" Bailey. Past State Commanders of the American Legion were introduced.

Tuesday

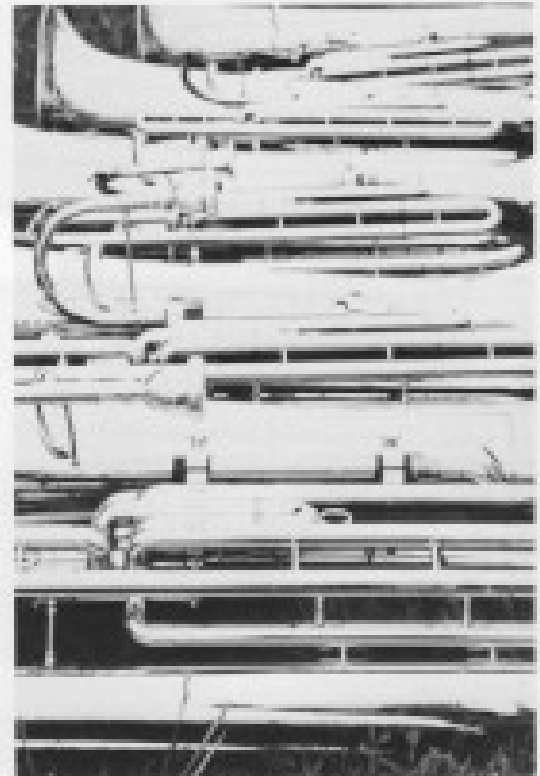
After breakfast, the first order of business at Boys' State was conducting the primary election. Most of the day was spent working on the government project for each city and county. This year at state, counties were divided in large and small counties to simulate 'real life' Kansas, with some cities being urban, others rural. Cities and counties had to deal with actual government and economic problems such as health care, unemployment and economic development.

During the evening, Federalist and Nationalist party rallies were held in McCain Auditorium, and the candidates for the general election were announced.

State officials Bob Stephan, Sally Thompson and Bill Graves addressed the states that evening as well.

Kansas American Legion Department Commander Gene Heinman addressed the delegates at McCain.

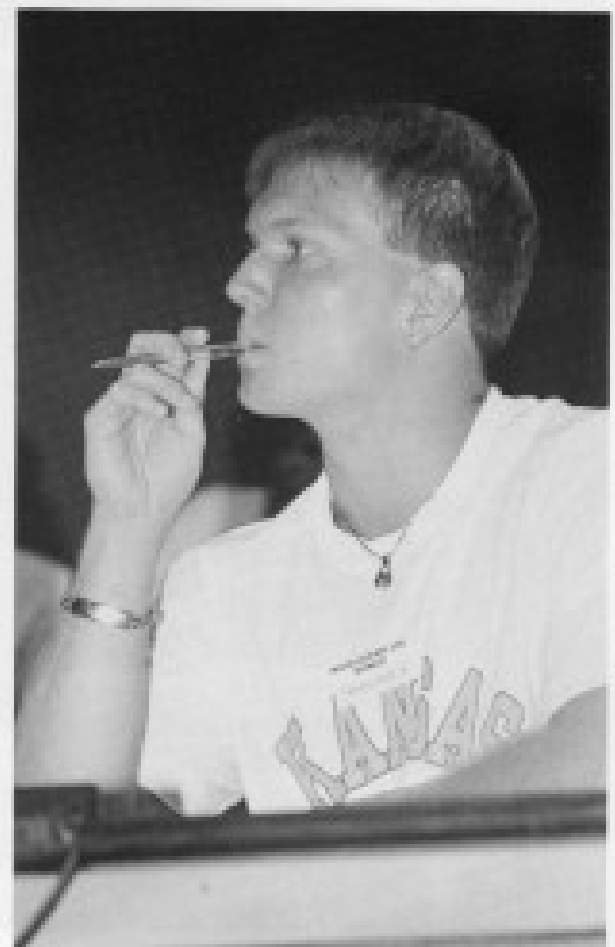

In many minds, the memories of city government projects, party conventions, the diversity of opinions gathered at Boys' State, and the thrill of elections were realized. Friday was a chance to catch their breath after a whirlwind week and look back with a sense of accomplishment.

The final ceremony to follow Saturday morning would put the week in a larger perspective by touching the very essence of what it means to be a citizen of Kansas and the United States of America.

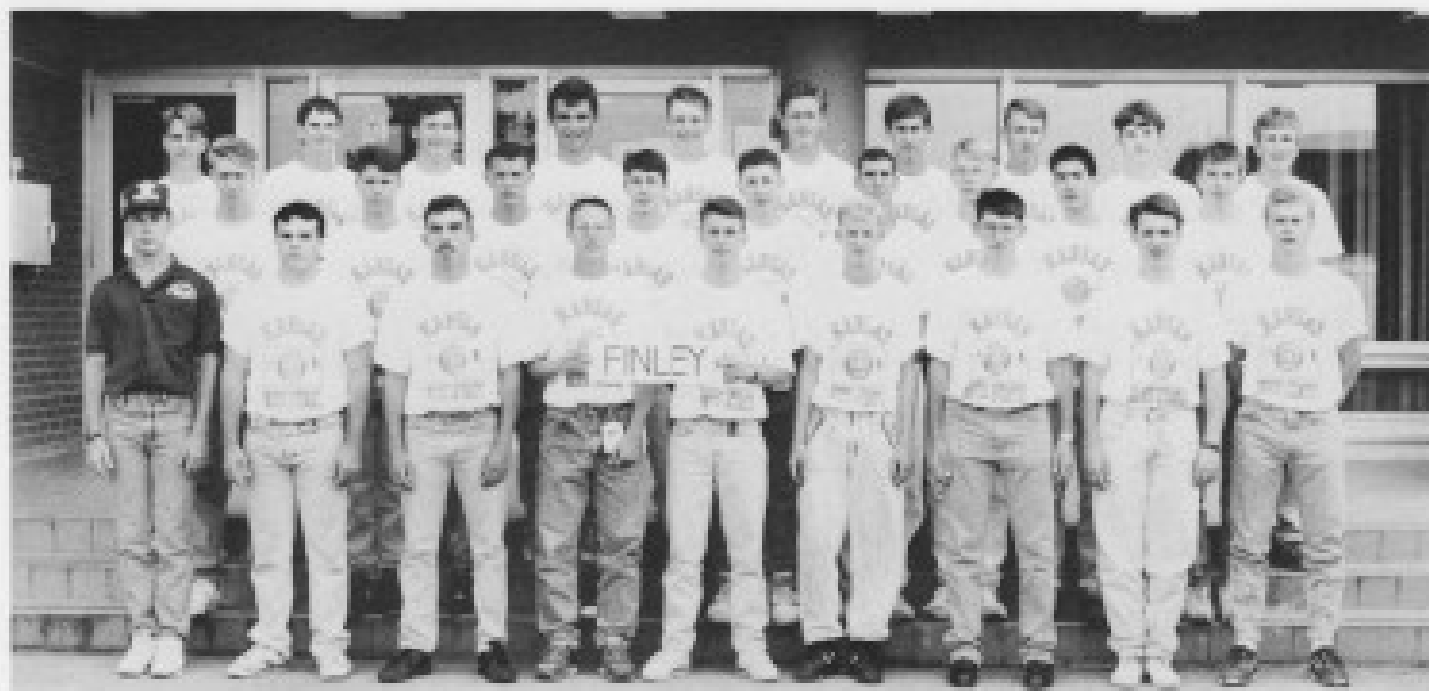
