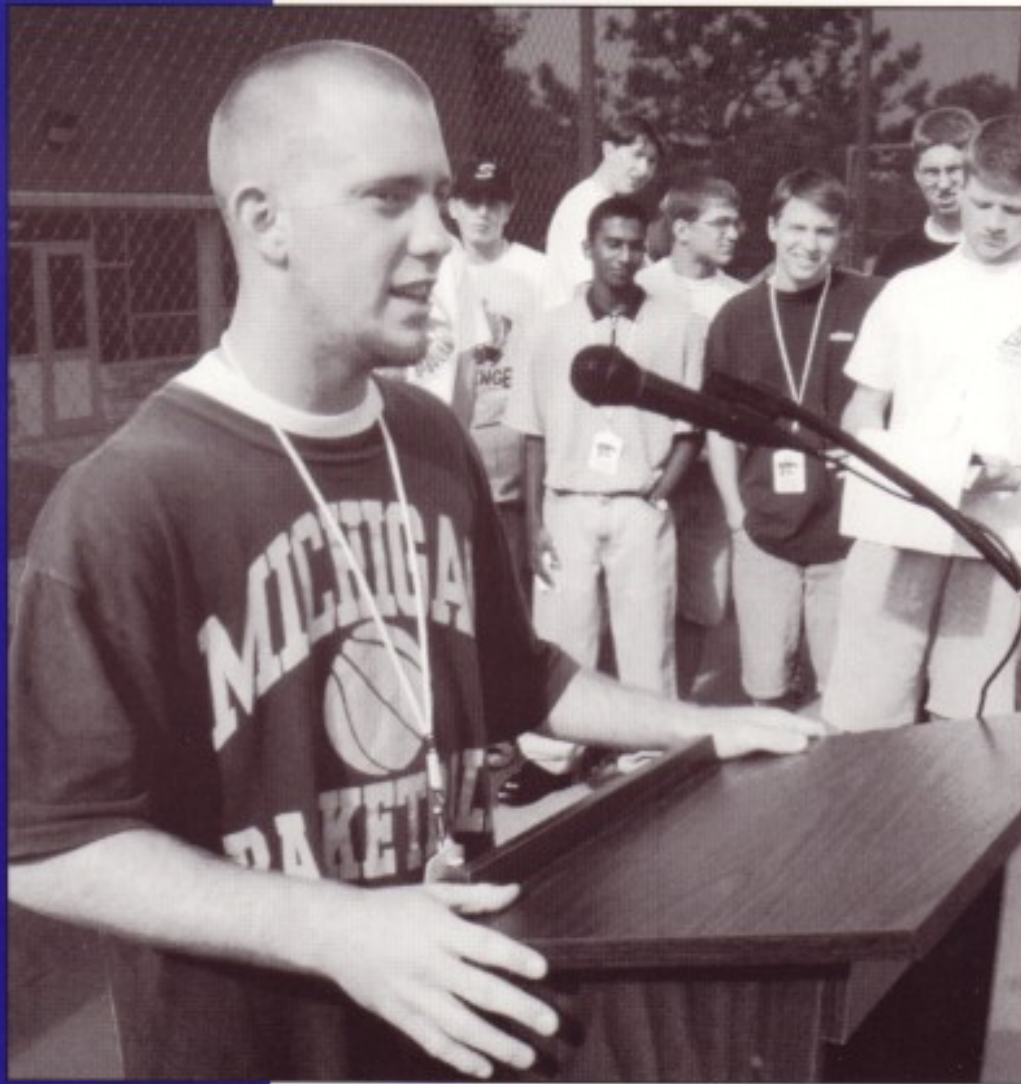

A Brief History of Boys' State

"To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation" is the purpose of the American Legion Boys' State program. It was organized by the Department of Illinois in 1935. The Department of Kansas, holding charter no. 5, was among the first to institute this week-long government-in-action program. Now, virtually every state department of the American Legion has its own Boys' State because of the program's ability to educate youth in practical politics and government operation.

Kansas Boys' State was headquartered in Wichita for 26 years before moving to the campus of the University of Kansas in 1963. It stayed there until 1992, when the program moved to Kansas State University.

The Boys' State program is available to any high school senior-to-be who meets the academic standards and demonstrates leadership potential. Civic and church groups, as well as American Legion posts, sponsor delegates to this fine learning-by-doing, youth-in-government program.

Almost 50,000 young men from across Kansas, including over 700 this year alone, have participated in Boys' State and performed nearly every function of city, county and state government. Former delegates, members of the American Legion and Sons of the American Legion return each year to serve as counselors and advisors for the program. Many of them work year around on ways to improve the curriculum and structure of the program.

During each session, two staters are chosen by their peers to represent Kansas at the American Legion Boys Nation, which convenes near Washington, D.C. In doing so, they participate in a learning-by-doing program that focuses on our national government.



Sunday



After registration, all delegates learned what roles they would play during the week (farmer, industrial worker, conservative, liberal, association member, and so forth) in this learning-by-doing simulation.



Monday



The bazaar Monday morning allowed all residents of Boys' State to meet the candidates for state offices, join associations, change parties, learn about all the issues they would soon debate, and contribute to campaigns.



One of the practical lessons learned at Boys' State is the influence money has on both candidates and parties. This influence can be very positive, but without checks and balances, people often begin to wonder what happened to their financial contribution.

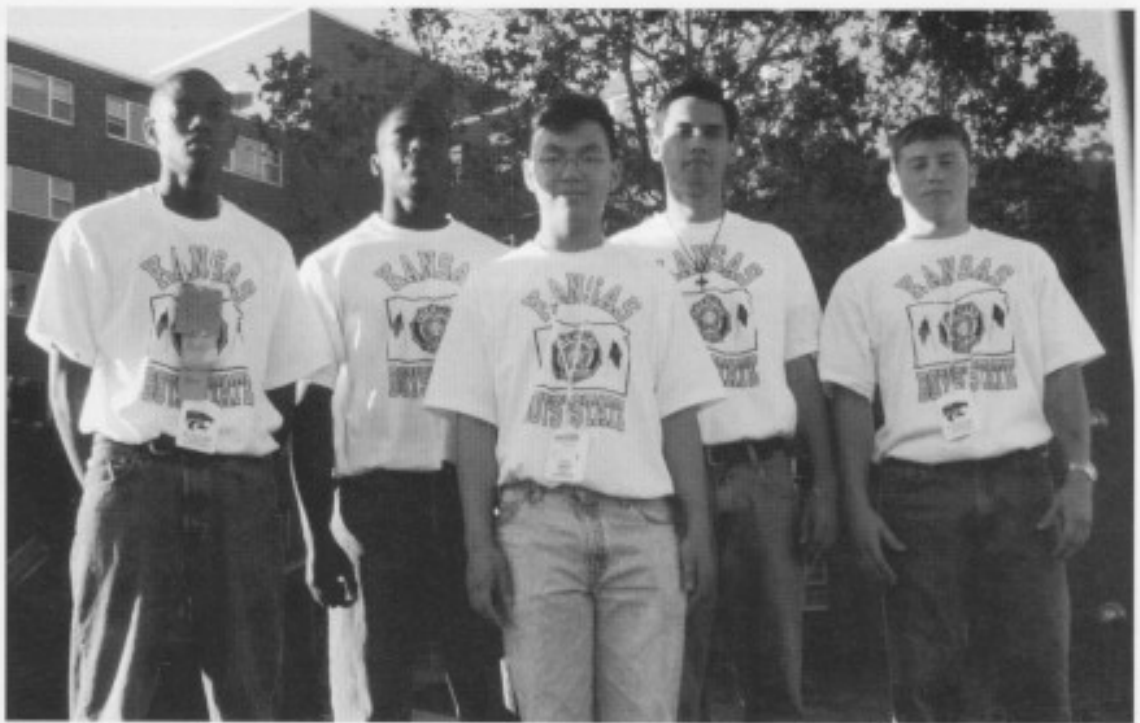

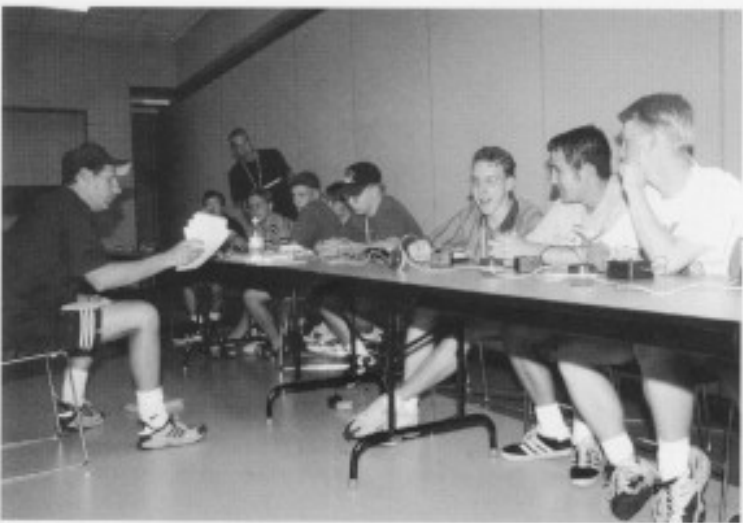

During the week, staters were given the opportunity to compete in organized basketball, volleyball and softball through K-State's Recreation Services just north of Marlatt and Goodnow Halls.



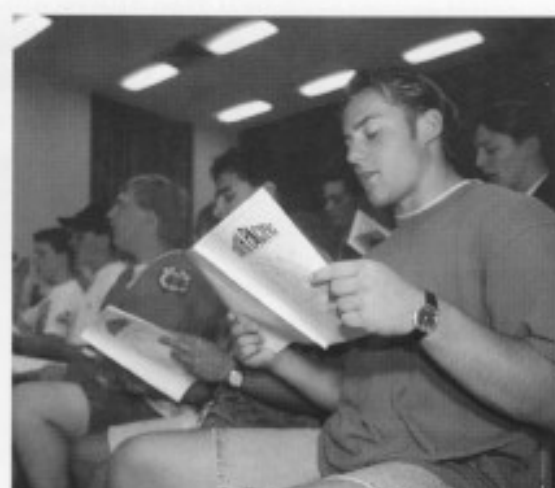
One of the highlights of the week was the Boys' State Band concert.

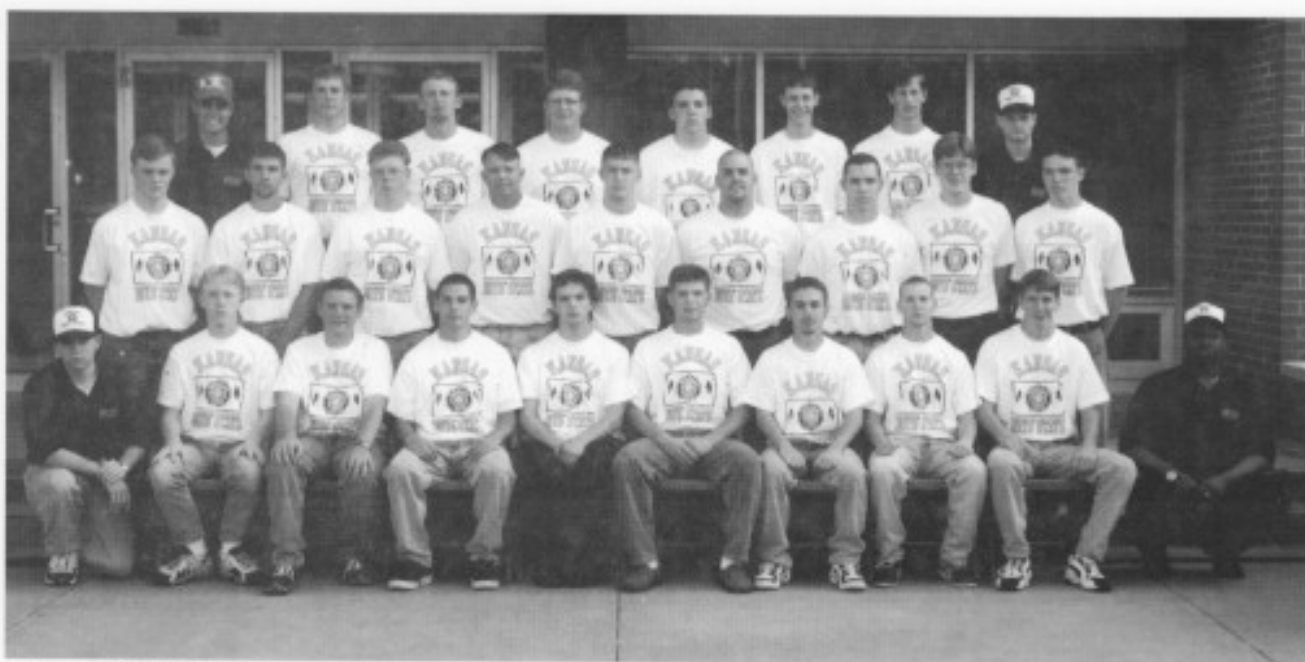
