

"To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation." That is the purpose of the American Legion Boys State program. It was organized by the Department of Illinois in 1935. The Department of Kansas, holding Charter No. 5, was among the first to institute this week-long government-in-action program.

The American Legion Boys State of Kansas was headquartered in Wichita for 26 years before moving to the University of Kansas in 1963. It stayed there until 1992 when the program moved to its present location on the campus of Kansas State University.


The Boys State program is available to any high school senior-to-be who meets academic criteria and demonstrates leadership potential. Civic and church groups as well as American Legion Posts sponsor delegates to this fine learning-by-doing, youth-in-government program.

Almost 50,000 young men from across Kansas have participated in Boys State and performed nearly every function of city, county, and state government. Former delegates, members of the American Legion, and Sons of the American Legion return each year to serve as counselors and advisors. Many of them work year-round on ways to improve the curriculum and structure of the program.

At the conclusion of each session, two Staters are chosen by their peers to represent Kansas at the American Legion Boys Nation in Washington, D.C. These two individuals participate in a learning-by-doing program that focuses on our government at the national level.




After choosing candidates in the primaries, the staters began to look forward to finally choosing the top positions at Boys State. To show the staters who they were voting for, the state official hopefuls participated in a debate, officiated by the PACs at McCain Auditorium. Afterward, voters cast ballots in the general election to determine the new leaders of Boys State. The results of the general election were announced during the evening retreat, and the Manhattan Legion Post presented a flag retirement ceremony. Following the retreat, delegates attended Town Hall Meetings where three speakers from different government offices gave speeches.
